He wouldn’t have lost everything if he had built a better shelter.

Technology & Media	Grammar: Will / Going to for prediction Vocab: technology, innovation, virtual, media, platform, digital, trend, artificial + collocations (make/do, take part in) implicitly	1. I think AI will revolutionize many industries. 2. They’re going to launch a new app next month. 3. Platforms like social media make communication far easier.
Lesson 10 – “Justice & Judgement” What’s right, what’s wrong – and how we decide.	Ethics	Grammar: Second Conditional + Passive Voice + Modal Perfects (can’t have, shouldn’t have, needn’t have) Vocab: justice, ethical, responsibility, blame, judicial, accuse, punish	1. You shouldn’t have overlooked the signs. 2. If there were no consequences, people might act differently. 3. They can’t have known the truth and remain silent
